# From the Deputy Grand Master

#### A FEW THOUGHTS ON RETENTION

Among the more significant issue we need to address in Colorado Masonry is retention of our members. Over the last 20 years, nearly 45% of the men who petitioned for the degrees of masonry failed to progress to Master Mason. In the last 5 years, 55% of the men who petitioned a lodge did not make it to master mason. We're bring men in, but we are not keeping them. So, what can we do to improve these numbers. There's no silver bullet, but there are several things we can do to improve our retention.

First, we need to set expectations with our candidates about masonry is about. When doing the interviews, we need to let them know that they will be required to memorize some of our lessons, and we need to explain why (and believe) that is important. We need to explain to them that we want and need them to be involved in the lodge. We need to explain to them the importance of our lessons and how it can impact the quality of their own lives. In a recent presentation at the conference of Grand Masters, the Masonic Renewal Association revealed that most men seeking to join masonry are looking for three things: companionship, self-improvement, and charity. That sounds a lot like the Brotherly love, relief and truth that masonry promises to our new entered apprentices. We offer what these men are looking for.

When inviting them to the lodge, we need to make sure that the lodge is in good repair and well maintained. The initial impression they have of the lodge will be important in determining whether they will want to spend time there. We also need to learn about them as they are learning about us. Before

handing them a petition, the lodge brethren should truly know who they are. I urge you to have new candidates come to dinner with your lodge or other open events, to learn what your lodge and lodge members are like and your lodge members get a real chance to get to know the candidate. Realistically, it will take at least several months to really get to know the candidate. We need to make sure that not only are they the right fit for masonry, but that we are a good fit for them. If not, perhaps another lodge will be the fit.

Equally, if not more, important, we need to perform our ritual and degree work with mastery and meaning. Every word in our rituals has deep meaning for those seeking it, but if the work is done poorly and without practice, it leaves the candidate with a poor impression about the importance of our lessons and consequently of masonry. If we do not put the effort in to breathing life into our ritual, why would a new candidate or EA put in the effort to try to learn the meaning. If it's not important to us, it will not be important to them.

Once initiated, we need to deliver on the promises we make. In terms of brotherly love, we need to make sure our members feel welcome and involved. Appoint a mentor to meet them at the meeting, maybe even share a ride to the meeting, be there for any questions, and to help walk them through the ritual and masonic protocols. Similarly, a lodge that is in discord or when members are openly disruptive and unfriendly toward each other will quickly drive away newer members. New members want to spend time in a place that is happy, welcoming, and fulfilling (and so do the older members). Bring the new members into the fold. Do not let them remain an outsider that feels excluded by existing cliques in the lodge. It's up to us to create a welcoming environment.

Next, we need to teach our newer members how to be masons and what that means. Most lodges hold "posting sessions" for EAs and sometimes FCs (why not MMs too when we can openly discuss everything). These sessions not only teach them the memorization that will be expected of them but should review the meaning of the degree and its lessons, what the symbols and working tools mean and how they can be applied in their lives on a daily basis. I would suggest having a dedicated person or team of persons who do the posting sessions with the new candidates and EAs. With experience will come expertise. The mentor should also be

involved.

Get the candidate involved in the lodge. While I am not a big proponent of putting them in an officer role before, they have learned what it is to be a mason, there are many other activities that the lodge should be doing that you can involve them in. Find out what skills and interests they have and assign them to a role in the lodge that uses those skills and develops those interests. You'll never know what skills and interests they have unless you ask, keep a list and then use that information. In fact, if you haven't discussed this in lodge, I would recommend doing so with all of your members at least once a year. The education for the meeting can be as simple as asking the members to explain why they joined masonry, why they stayed in masonry, and what they would like to see the lodge do and accomplish. Does your lodge want more esoteric education, do they want to do more family-oriented activities, do the brothers want to do fun activities with or without their families? Find out what is a good lodge experience for your lodge. Follow up on that discussion with an inquiry as to what each member can bring to bear to accomplish those desires.

Many men are looking for a place to give back. What does your lodge do to help your community and contribute to charitable causes? Some of the most meaningful charity I have done in masonry has been when my lodge actually helps other people, beyond just contributing money. Helping the elderly with yard work, helping a brother who needs help with a special project, building a fence for a worthy charitable organization, or handing out turkeys at Thanksgiving to the poor are activities that I have done with my lodge that not only help the community, but provide a real sense of helping others and a sense of fulfillment in me. It also helps raise community awareness about the good masonry can do and does.

Self-improvement is an area where masonry shine more than most other organizations. Many of our newer members are looking for spiritual enlightenment. To be part of something bigger than themselves. Teach them our masonic and spiritual lessons in their posting sessions. Suggest articles and books that they should read to explore some of the deeper meanings of masonry. Teach them to know themselves first. Have one of your members or an outside speaker do a presentation on a masonic topic. Masonic speakers can be found in a variety of

locations: the members of your lodge, the Colorado Grand Lodge education page on the website, your local research lodge, the Masonic Service Association website, John Nagy's YouTube channel, and books on masonic education that can be delivered in lodge, just to name a few.

The discussion here is just the tip of the iceberg. I hope you continue this discussion with your lodge, with your lodge officers and with the Grand Lodge. In the end, brethren, whether your lodge grows and flourishes, or withers and dies, is a value proposition. Your members need to find more value in being involved in the lodge and spending time with the brethren in it, than the value they perceive of sitting home watching TV or doing some other activity. However, when we deliver on providing brotherly love (companionship and involvement), relief (charity and doing good deeds), and truth (education and self-improvement), most lodges will succeed. We just need to do it.

#### Creation of Spanish Speaking Pilot Lodge for Colorado

Whereas, On February 15<sup>th</sup>, 1881, the Grand Lodge of Colorado saw that it was good for the Craft and particularly its members to create a German speaking lodge named Schiller Lodge No. 41. This charter was granted upon the condition that the work to be used should be a literal translation, as far as possible, of the ritual adopted by this Grand Lodge. Schiller Lodge was organized by brethren who speak the German language, with authority to work in the German tongue. Shiller Lodge merged over the years and has survived under the current name of Marquis de Lafayette #41 and still performs degree work in the German language ...143 years later.

Whereas, from 2018 to 2022 the Spanish speaking population of Colorado has increased from 11% to 19% with a statistical probability to increase even further. On investigation the Grand Lodge of Colorado has found the neighboring jurisdictions of Arizona, Nevada, and California have found value and success is creating and supporting Spanish speaking lodges.

**Therefore,** be it resolved that, as of this day, October 9, 2024, the Grand Lodge of Colorado, Ancient Free and Accepted Masons (AF&AM), does hereby create a Pilot Lodge of Harmony Lodge #61 and grants them dispensation to perform Ritual work and Masonic Ceremonies in the Spanish Language. This dispensation is granted upon the condition that the work to be used should be a literal translation, as far as possible, of the ritual adopted by this Grand Lodge.

**Be it further resolved,** that this dispensation requires that all communication between Harmony Lodge 61 and the Grand Lodge of Colorado AF&AM and all other masonic organizations recognized by the Grand Lodge of Colorado AF&AM will continue to be in the English language and all filings will continue to be in the English language.

In witness whereof, I, Most Worshipful Brother David J. Reynolds, Grand Master of Masons in Colorado, have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the Grand Lodge of Colorado to be affixed.

# The Lion, the Duck, and the Altar: Silent symbolism in *A Rose Upon the Altar*

At the request of Most Worshipful Grand Master David L. Reynolds, a special production of *A Rose Upon the Altar* was presented during the Grand Lodge of Colorado's Annual Communication events on January 24, 2025, just prior to the grand installation. In that performance, two prominent characters sported canes which were more than simple stage props - they were silent symbols of the play's central themes.

The play A Rose Upon the Altar tells the story of a small-town Masonic lodge in danger of losing its only potential meeting place and a wealthy man and disillusioned Mason facing a quiet personal crisis of his own. The lodge has little money but has for countless years been active in charitable support of those in need among the community. The brethren's focus on providing charity has caused some late rent payments. The wealthiest brother is much more concerned with business affairs and paying the lodge rent on time than with charitable concerns, which he sees as the role of others, more especially the church. Through the interaction of the brethren in the lodge – at times heated, contrary, and undignified, yet honest and sincere – and through important choices to take action outside of the tiled meeting, powerful transformations unfold and both crises are resolved.

Ideas represented by two important characters, Horace Bentley, the town's wealthiest citizen and strictly business minded brother, and Dr. Blair, the lodge chaplain and church pastor, are the focus of this article. Each character represents very different values at the start of the play, and in this particular presentation, each carried a symbolic cane representing those values.

Horace Bentley - Lion Head Cane


Lions have long held a significant, yet multi-faceted symbolism - both across cultures and in the Bible. They have a dual symbolic nature that is at times threatening and destructive and at other times courageous, protective, and benevolent. They also have a long association with leadership, authority, and ruling power and the wealth and prestige that accompanies such power.

Threatening and destructive: Lions are powerful predators and naturally arouse fear due to the

threat their potent jaws and claws pose to unarmed humans and domesticated livestock. A lion at rest and undisturbed can appear quite tame, but they are capable of explosive attack. The Bible has several references to men and animals killed by lions.

• Courageous and Protective: In the Bible, righteous people are said to have the courage of a lion, and God is sometimes said to attack or defend against enemies with the fierce strength of a lion. A pair of stone lions also symbolically guard the gates and entrances to countless Chinese and other Asian temples and palaces due to the protective power perceived in the lion.





• Wealth, status, and prestige: Drawing from its association with the leaders of state and industry, as well perhaps from the Asian custom, it was common from the Victorian era through today for grand and wealthy homes and public structures to display stone lions out front as silent guardians and symbols of prestige and clout.

Horace Bentley carries a lion-headed cane in this interpretation of the play, and during his visit to Doric lodge in Act I, we see him wielding it as a status symbol of his wealth and as an intimidating tool, pounding the ground to make his points when speaking and threatening those who stand in his way.

A wealthy, but lonely man, Bentley's use of his cane at the start of the play suggests that he is leaning on his wealth and status in a negative way, as the sole support and comfort in his life. By the end of the play, we see Bentley leave his cane behind at the altar, and through the transformation that takes place in him, the meaning of the lion has transformed from threatening to benevolent, as well.

Dr. Blair - Duck Head Cane

Ducks are not explicitly referenced in the Bible anywhere, with the possible exception as a

menu item at a feast of Solomon (as "choice fowl"). However, ducks carry important symbolism derived from their association with water and when included in the "birds of the air" metaphors in the sacred text.

Ducks are said to represent community, faith, hope, and the transformation of renewal or rebirth.

- Community: Ducks often thrive together in groups, living in harmony. We are encouraged to support and aid one another, lifting each other up in community as brethren and members of our larger Masonic family.
- Faith: As ducks float serenely upon the water and even dive down into the apparent unknown below the surface, we should be inspired to move gracefully through life and through uncertainty with our faith and trust in God to guide and assure us along the way.
- Hope: Ducks walk on land, swim and dive in water, and even fly through the air. As they are able to change their mechanics of movement to adjust to different environments, we are reminded to adapt to changing circumstances and have hope for a brighter future throughout changing times.

Transformation/Renewal/Rebirth: Water often represents purification, transformation, and new beginnings. As ducks masterfully dwell in water, they evoke to us the cleansing and renewing power of God's grace and spirit.

Dr. Blair uses his cane not as a status symbol, but as an actual aid and support for a slight physical ailment. The cane strengthens and comforts him physically as he goes about his daily activities, just as the principles of faith, hope, and renewal give him strength mentally and spiritually when he needs aid in moving through life's challenges and celebrating life's joys.

There are three important lessons to take away from this article:

1. The real value of ritual and symbolism is unlocked when contemplated, explored, discussed with others, and lived.

The silent symbolism of these canes was not called for or spelled out in the play's script. The meaning carried by these canes in the minds of the cast, which we hoped to subtly convey to the audience, arose from a combination of luck, individual contemplation, brotherly discussion, and perhaps some assistance from the Great Architect.

It began with a small character note in the play's script, stating that the character of Chaplain Dr. Blair "uses a cane." This small note led to several enjoyable conversations, meaningful coincidences, deepened personal connections, enhanced understanding of the lessons of the story, and other unexpected discoveries.

This same experience can be found in our Masonic ritual by selecting a particular symbol or word to question, contemplate it, research it, discuss it with others, relate

it to your own life, and carry it forward as a reminder to live the lessons gained through that process.

2. Life - and Masonry - is largely how we choose to view it and interact with it.

Both the lion and duck canes in the play had somethings in common. They each shared a common structure and could be used for the same purposes - positive and negative. It is up to the wielder of the cane to determine if it is used for supporting good or ill.

Each cane could be broken down into four pieces for easy travel. The wooden shaft unscrews into three separate parts, and the metal head separates into a fourth part.

- o The three wood pieces forming into one could symbolize the three degrees of Craft Freemasonry and also the trinity or tripartite nature of deity.
- o The brass heads of the lion and duck can symbolize the philosophy or world view with which we "grasp" and relate to the lessons of Masonry and how we interact with and see our relationship with our Creator. Depending on our perspective, beliefs, and expectations of what is possible and appropriate for us, we will wield our canes in different ways that fit those ideas. If we improve, evolve, and reform our thoughts, then our words and actions can likewise im-

prove and evolve for the better, and our lives, relationships, and our legacy can improve as a result.

3. Whatever our current circumstances of regret, challenge, or difficulty, we can seek renewal by reconnecting with our Creator in prayer to begin a new direction forward starting today.

Horace Bentley was in denial of his crisis, but he heard the words of Hope from Dr. Blair who tried guiding Bentley back to the Light, to the altar where "the distressed find comfort." In the truest display of Brotherly Love, Dr. Blair reminded Horace Bentley of the power of God's love in his book upon the altar. Horace Bentley listened to this wise counsel even though the truth caused him shame and embarrassment.

The ever-present potential for personal transformation through forgiveness, redemption, and renewal is the most important lesson of the three presented here, and one of the most important taught by the story of *A Rose Upon the Altar*.

It's been many years since this play has been performed in Colorado. Some may point to the fact that the play is not an official part of ritual or duty and they would be correct in that view. However, there was a reason why MWB David requested a performance of this classic tale. We see a world around us in division. Such ebbs and flows have been a persistent part of humanity to be sure and, while we as masons work to spread the cement of brotherly love and affection, we are not immune to divisions of our own.

We've all witnessed petty issues escalate. Some of us have been authors of such esca-



lations, not so much out of malice for our brethren but, for our immovable anchor to an idea. Horace Bently believed he was correct in his desires, while others viewed the issue from another angle they felt was just and true. Could it be that both views were *simultaneously right and wrong*? Pondering this question, perhaps plays of this sort should have a more common viewing among the craft. Perhaps such efforts will teach us new ways to wield our tools and appreciate the endless beauty of our craft.

# Band Camp!





This five-day band camp is held June 30 to July 4, 2025 on the University of Northern Colorado campus in Greeley, Colorado. The camp is a rewarding and exciting opportunity for promising band students to attend a first-rate marching band clinic and meet students from around Colorado.

Music activities are directed by the UNC band faculty and staff. Camp culminates with the performance of an evening concert on campus July 3<sup>rd</sup>, and marching in the Greeley Rocky Mountain Stampede Parade on July 4<sup>th</sup>.

**Camp is FREE.** Costs (excluding travel to and from Greeley) are paid in full by Colorado Masons and affiliates. Student housing, social and recreational activities are sponsored by Colorado Masonic Lodges and affiliated organizations.

The camp accepts talented 9<sup>th</sup>, 10<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> grade students enrolled in a Colorado high school band program during the 2024-25 school year; capable of performing in the parade, and who play at least one marching band instrument.

Application forms or donations should be submitted by April 19, 2025. Recipients will be notified by the first week in May. Enrollment is limited to 120 students, so don't delay in contacting your High School Band Director.

# 1881 Capitol Trowels





The engraved ceremonial trowel on the left was presented to the MWGM Robert A. Quilliam by the Denver City Council at the laying of the cornerstone of City Hall in Dener, 1881. The plain trowel above was recovered by RWB George B. Clark and corresponds to an old newspaper article entitled "Trowel Used...". The trowel is a deeply symbolic implement of our craft and typically are given to the institution at which the cornerstone is laid. Sometimes these trowels are lost to time but the museum is very fortunate to have preserved these important pieces!

# Membership Awareness and Retention

Greetings Worshipful Masters, Officers, and Brothers:

As 2024 begins and we look to Freemasonry through the lens of membership, awareness, and retention, I wonder how many of our lodges are actively engaged in membership, awareness, and retention in their lodges and in the local communities?

I would like to hear from the lodge representatives on what they are doing to promote the craft from membership to awareness in their lodges and community at large. What are the various ways that you maintain the members' awareness and interest of the craft? What local programs do you have in place to expand your membership locally?

One program for consideration for 2024 is the creation of a Craft Warden position or appointee and I bet that some of the lodges already have a similar position in place, but I would also like to know if that is the case for those that do and those that do not.

The concept of the Craft Warden would be to address the above membership and awareness activities inside the individual lodges and build an interface between the lodges and membership & awareness and the GL district lecturer. The Craft Warden would be responsible for local membership & awareness activities for your lodge and allowing for a larger base of ideas and exchange of information between the GL committee and the lodges. The position could encompass things like holding and scheduling local training and presentations for your lodge as educational, awareness, retention type material, candidate open houses or even scheduling digital meetings based on approved content and format as an open meeting.

A coordinator for any and all membership and awareness, and retention for the members and prospects for your lodge and local area but focusing on membership and awareness. By nature, the responsibilities of the Craft Warden and membership/awareness committee and GL District Lecturer will cross over into the education committee arena where the Craft Warden would find online content for various presentations, educational materials and more from the members login from the education portal.

It is time that we engage and invest in the lodges into their future and build on our wider experiences that a lot of us are doing today. I would like to get a feeling from the lodges if such a program would be embraced and if they would consider creating such a position.

Our emblem features THREE STEPS which symbolize he three degrees of a Master Mason. The clock is at HIGH TWELVE. But most important is our motto.


