Freemasonry and Cinco de Mayo

In Freemasonry, the Brothers of the Fraternity have a well deserved reputation for tolerance and acceptance of all religions, beliefs, ethnicities, race and orientations. In the Grand Lodge of Colorado, we are blessed with Brothers of all walks of life and being not very far from the country of Mexico, we have quite a few Brothers in the jurisdiction of Mexican descent. MWB David Reynolds just last year created a pilot program for our first Spanish speaking Lodge within the Jurisdiction, which is Harmony #61 in Denver. As such, Colorado Masonry is greatly enriched by the many cultures that reside within our borders. Of those cultures, Mexico in particular celebrates May 5th, 1862 with great exuberance as this date commemorates the battle of Puebla against the invasion of the French forces sent by Napoleon III

But first, a little bit about the history of Freemasonry in Mexico¹. Freemasonry in Mexico can be traced back to at least 1806 when the first Masonic Lodges were formally established in the nation. Several presidents of Mexico were Freemasons, some of whom we'll discuss. Holders of conservative ideas gathered in Lodges of the Scottish Rite, while reformists chose the York Rite. Hence, the Scottish Rite became synonymous with conservatives and the York Rite with the Liberals. Santa Anna, a name that you will likely recognize from his conflicts with the United States was a Scottish Rite Mason. He was later ousted by Benito Juarez, another Freemason who challenges the forces of Napoleon III during the French Invasion.

A few interesting points of note are the many Freemasons who fought for Mexico during the Battle of Puebla to help secure this unlikely victory against a significantly superior force in the

French. In the run up to the battle, the forces of the republic of Mexico were in dire straits indeed as the French had allied with the Mexican conservatives in 1861 and followed that with a full invasion of Mexico. The Monroe Doctrine was in place at the time in the United States preventing any European power from meddling in our hemisphere, but in 1862 the United States had it's own problem with our Civil War. It is needless to say, the United States government did not interfere at any great level to assist our southern neighbor during their time of need.

The commanding general of the Battle of Puebla was Ignacio Zaragoza, who was a member of Minerva Lodge #44 of the National Mexican Rite (the NMR consists of 9 degrees based on the Scottish Rite system). His command of his forces against a superior army involved quite a few Masons under his command which helped lead them to victory. Sadly, Zaragoza would celebrate his victory only briefly as he died later that same year from typhoid fever at the age of 33 (quite Masonic, if I do say so...). One of Zaragoza's generals was Felipe Berriozabal who served valiantly in the battle but was later taken prisoner. He later served as Secretary of War under president Benito Juarez, mentioned above. Yet another Freemason serving during the battle was Porfirio Diaz as calvary commander. He later became the presiding Grand Officer of the unified Mexican Rites (combining the factions of the Scottish Rite and York Rite alluded to earlier) and subsequently served as President of Mexico after challenging Benito Juarez.

In conclusion Brothers, Cinco de Mayo is a festive day celebrated by many a margarita and our Brothers of Mexican heritage can celebrate not only in their national pride in this victorious battle but the importance of Freemasonry in much of the military command during the battle. So I encourage all of the Brothers of the Grand Lodge of Colorado to raise a margarita or a Modelo on May 5 and celebrate the history of Freemasonry and it's part in the victory of the Battle of Puebla on May 5th, 1862. Viva la Mexico!

Creation of Spanish Speaking Pilot Lodge for Colorado

Whereas, On February 15th, 1881, the Grand Lodge of Colorado saw that it was good for the Craft and particularly its members to create a German speaking lodge named Schiller Lodge No. 41. This charter was granted upon the condition that the work to be used should be a literal translation, as far as possible, of the ritual adopted by this Grand Lodge. Schiller Lodge was organized by brethren who speak the German language, with authority to work in the German tongue. Shiller Lodge merged over the years and has survived under the current name of Marquis de Lafayette #41 and still performs degree work in the German language ...143 years later.

Whereas, from 2018 to 2022 the Spanish speaking population of Colorado has increased from 11% to 19% with a statistical probability to increase even further. On investigation the Grand Lodge of Colorado has found the neighboring jurisdictions of Arizona, Nevada, and California have found value and success is creating and supporting Spanish speaking lodges.

Therefore, be it resolved that, as of this day, October 9, 2024, the Grand Lodge of Colorado, Ancient Free and Accepted Masons (AF&AM), does hereby create a Pilot Lodge of Harmony Lodge #61 and grants them dispensation to perform Ritual work and Masonic Ceremonies in the Spanish Language. This dispensation is granted upon the condition that the work to be used should be a literal translation, as far as possible, of the ritual adopted by this Grand Lodge.

Be it further resolved, that this dispensation requires that all communication between Harmony Lodge 61 and the Grand Lodge of Colorado AF&AM and all other masonic organizations recognized by the Grand Lodge of Colorado AF&AM will continue to be in the English language and all filings will continue to be in the English language.

In witness whereof, I, Most Worshipful Brother David J. Reynolds, Grand Master of Masons in Colorado, have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the Grand Lodge of Colorado to be affixed.

Done at the Grand Lodge of Colorado, this 9th day of October 2024.

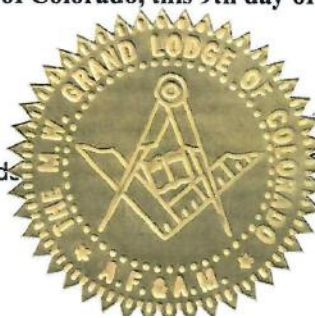

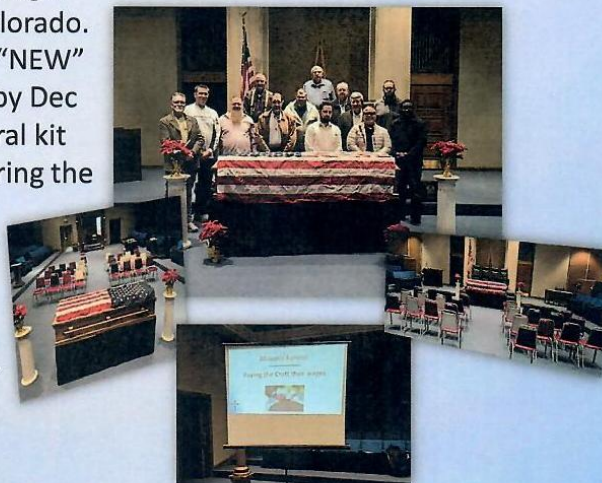

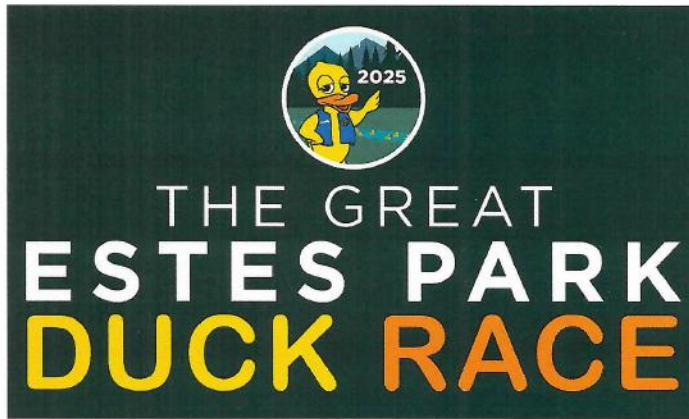
CHALLENGE TO ALL COLORADO LODGES

“Faith-7” NASA Mission Flag



This flag from Carbondale Lodge No. 82 was carried by NASA Astronaut and Colorado Mason Col. Leroy Gordon Cooper Jr. aboard the “Faith-7” Mission May 15th and 16th 1963 as the final phase of the Mercury Program. Col. Cooper is a national hero and made 22 orbits on that mission for over a half-million statute miles. In his NASA career Bro. Cooper logged more than 222 hours in space and was instrumental in developing key elements for the Apollo program. Bro. Cooper was also the command pilot for the Gemini 5 mission. He was a member of Glenwood Lodge No. 65 and raised in 1956. Bro. Cooper laid down his working tools October 4, 2004. He will be remembered for his heroic and patriotic sacrifices in space travel that set the stage for future Masonic astronauts and others to reach the moon!

This is the ninth in a series of articles highlighting the fascinating artifacts contained within the Grand Lodge Museum that you can see on your next visit. Membership Awareness and Retention

Greetings Worshipful Masters, Officers, and Brothers:

As 2024 begins and we look to Freemasonry through the lens of membership, awareness, and retention, I wonder how many of our lodges are actively engaged in membership, awareness, and retention in their lodges and in the local communities?

I would like to hear from the lodge representatives on what they are doing to promote the craft from membership to awareness in their lodges and community at large. What are the various ways that you maintain the members' awareness and interest of the craft? What local programs do you have in place to expand your membership locally?

One program for consideration for 2024 is the creation of a Craft Warden position or appointee and I bet that some of the lodges already have a similar position in place, but I would also like to know if that is the case for those that do and those that do not.

The concept of the Craft Warden would be to address the above membership and awareness activities inside the individual lodges and build an interface between the lodges and membership & awareness and the GL district lecturer. The Craft Warden would be responsible for local membership & awareness activities for your lodge and allowing for a larger base of ideas and exchange of information between the GL committee and the lodges. The position could encompass things like holding and scheduling local training and presentations for your lodge as educational, awareness, retention type material, candidate open houses or even scheduling digital meetings based on approved content and format as an open meeting.

A coordinator for any and all membership and awareness, and retention for the members and prospects for your lodge and local area but focusing on membership and awareness. By nature, the responsibilities of the Craft Warden and membership/awareness committee and GL District Lecturer will cross over into the education committee arena where the Craft Warden would find online content for various presentations, educational materials and more from the members login from the education portal.

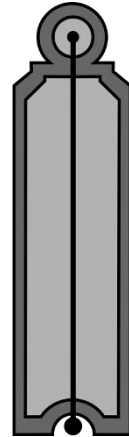
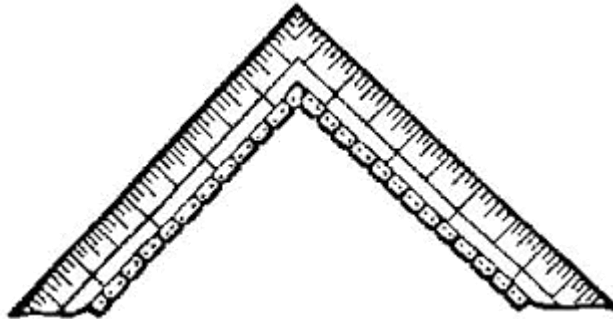
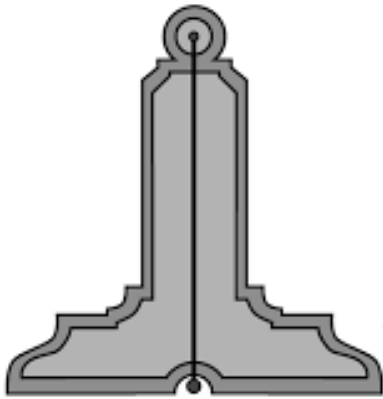
