Our Road is Paved with the Best Intentions. We need to make sure of our destination.

When one of my sons makes a mistake and exclaims, “I didn’t mean to do that!” I often respond, “It’s not important what you ‘didn’t mean to do’; what matters is what you meant to do and whether you were focused on it.”

As Masons, I believe it is crucial that we collectively pause to reflect on what we *do* mean to do. Over the past year, I have perceived a troubling increase in disharmony within Colorado Masonry. This disharmony does not stem from failing to learn our lessons, but from neglecting to apply them in practice. More specifically, while none of us intends to cause discord, we have collectively failed to be sufficiently *circumspect* in our speech and conduct.

An article from TheCraftsman.org recently struck a chord with me. It observed that by the 1890s, a conceptual misapprehension had become widespread in American Freemasonry. Many high-ranking officers who lacked deep Masonic understanding held the view that the entirety of Masonic knowledge and philosophy could be comprehensively absorbed through ritual recitation and monitorial lectures alone. The underlying implication was that one could master Masonry simply by memorizing the ritual, rather than embodying its principles in daily life.

We often speak of the lessons of Freemasonry in terms of ritual education. Yet one of the craft’s enduring secrets is that knowledge gained solely through reading, reciting, or ritual exemplification is incomplete. True learning—true enlightenment—comes only through persistent, deliberate application of the truths we have committed to memory, practiced in the liminal space between our initial darkness and gradual acquisition of light.

Consider the allegorical exchange between two brothers—Hiram and Solomon. Hiram

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repeatedly posed questions to Solomon, who responded each time differently. Although the questions seemed constant to Hiram, the variation in answers left him feeling deceived, ultimately resulting in a schism within the lodge when Solomon withdrew in offense. We know Solomon as steadfast and honorable, and Hiram as earnest, though misunderstood.

Hiram did not intend disrespect in accusing Solomon of lying, but what he failed to *mean* to do—and what truly mattered—was his failure to understand Solomon’s replies from Solomon’s perspective. Hiram neglected to seek clarity or respect the truth that might reside between differing viewpoints. He was not circumspect in his speech.

Solomon, too, was not without fault. As the elder and wiser of the two, he did not sufficiently consider why Hiram perceived deceit in his answers, nor did he attempt to heal the widening breach. His departure, though honorable to him, left the lodge fractured and burdened by unresolved grief.

This parable reminds us that actions—whether or not intended to cause discord—may nevertheless have significant, even devastating consequences. In eras past, such breaches among brethren of great renown would not have resulted merely in sadness but could have led to bloodshed. Hence, it is not enough to know the lessons of circumspection as theoretical concepts; we must consciously apply them to our behavior and interactions.

The wartime adage, "Loose lips sink ships," resonates deeply in the context of Freemasonry. For me, Masonry is a vessel—steady and steadfast—that has carried me from darkness into light over more than two decades. Through life’s storms, it has been a safe harbor, guiding me spiritually, personally, and professionally. It is simultaneously as mighty as a battleship and as fragile as a dinghy. When Masonry is at its strongest, we often forget the risks around us; but when it is delicate, a single careless word may sink the spirit of the craft.

The idea that careless talk might imperil Freemasonry is unsettling. Yet in recent years, I have witnessed the erosion caused by such lapses. In our commendable desire to make Freemasonry more accessible and welcoming, perhaps we have allowed the admonition to be circumspect to fade. I have frequently repeated the saying “Freemasonry is not a secret society, but rather a private society *with* secrets.” However, it seems we have

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underestimated the protective value of secrecy and discretion as an expression of circumspection. Secrecy should not be viewed as exclusionary but as an essential practice to guard the integrity and harmony of the Craft.

We must endeavor to be more circumspect in all our speech. My wife likes to observe that Masons, at times, resemble a bunch of old women gossiping over needlework. Gossip and circumspection are fundamentally incompatible. If our families and communities see us in this light, we have failed in our duty.

We are reminded frequently that lodge business should remain confined to the lodge itself. Lodges are *tiled* for a reason; non-Masons simply cannot appreciate the full context behind our decisions and discussions. It is incumbent upon us to protect this sanctity by ensuring that our matters remain within our fraternity.

Allowing rumors and speculation to circulate about lodge members causes irreparable damage—not just to individuals, but to the character and reputation of the lodge itself. Left unchecked, such damage can escalate, eventually harming our state jurisdictions and Freemasonry as a whole.

In sum, this moment calls for us all to renew our commitment to circumspection in thought, speech, and deed. Let us embrace the true spirit of Masonry—not merely the letter—and focus earnestly on what we *do* mean to do. Only then can we restore harmony and strengthen the bonds that hold our Craft together.

Eastlake, Colorado, serving in all the Offices of the Lodge and was installed as Worshipful Master in 1985. He was District Lecturer of the Grand Lodge from 1986-1990 and was Grand Orator of the Grand Lodge in 1987. M. W. Brother Callahan was Chairman of the Drug Study Group form 1988-1990. 2025 Matching Grants for Lodge Scholarships

Colorado Masons and their lodges have enjoyed great success with the Matching Grant program for many years. Students from all over Colorado have had financial assistance from their local lodges participating in Matching Grants. The Board of the Benevolent Fund sincerely appreciates the support shown by the lodges and is most pleased to continue the Matching Grant program.

The Matching Grants for 2025 will be up to \$500.00. To qualify for the full \$500 match, the Lodge would need to award an educational grant to a 2025 public high school graduating senior who will attend a Colorado institution of higher education. If the Lodge gives a total of \$1,000.00 or more to their chosen student, the match would be for half that amount, or \$500. If a lodge gives less than \$1,000, the match would be for half of the amount of the lodge grant. It is highly recommended that the Lodge checks be made out to the school or to the student AND the school.

One change in the Matching Grant program retained from last year is that a lodge can give a scholarship to more than one student in their area and apply for a match for each scholarship granted.

The deadline for requesting the matching grant is June 30, 2025. The form should be returned by email to: education@cmbfa.org, or by snail mail to Scholarship Administrator, PO Box 703, Westminster, CO. If using regular mail, it must be postmarked by June 30, 2025 and received by July 8th. Checks will be distributed to Lodges the end of June or end of July depending on when the request forms are received and logged in.

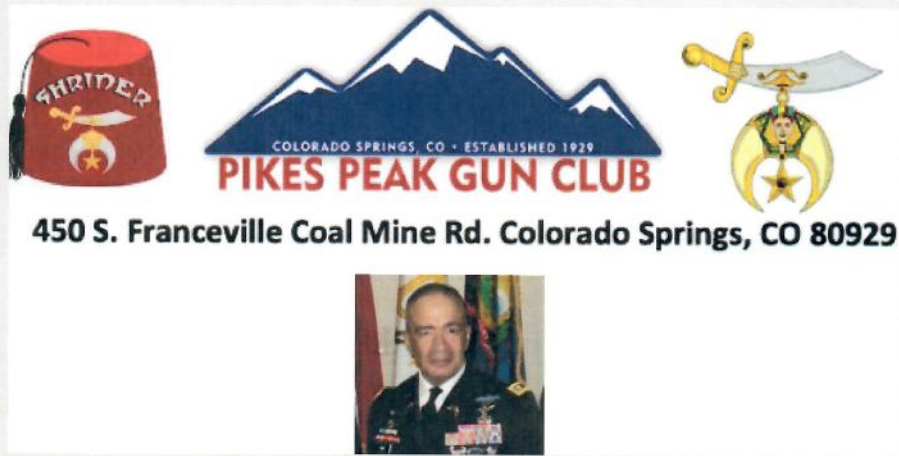

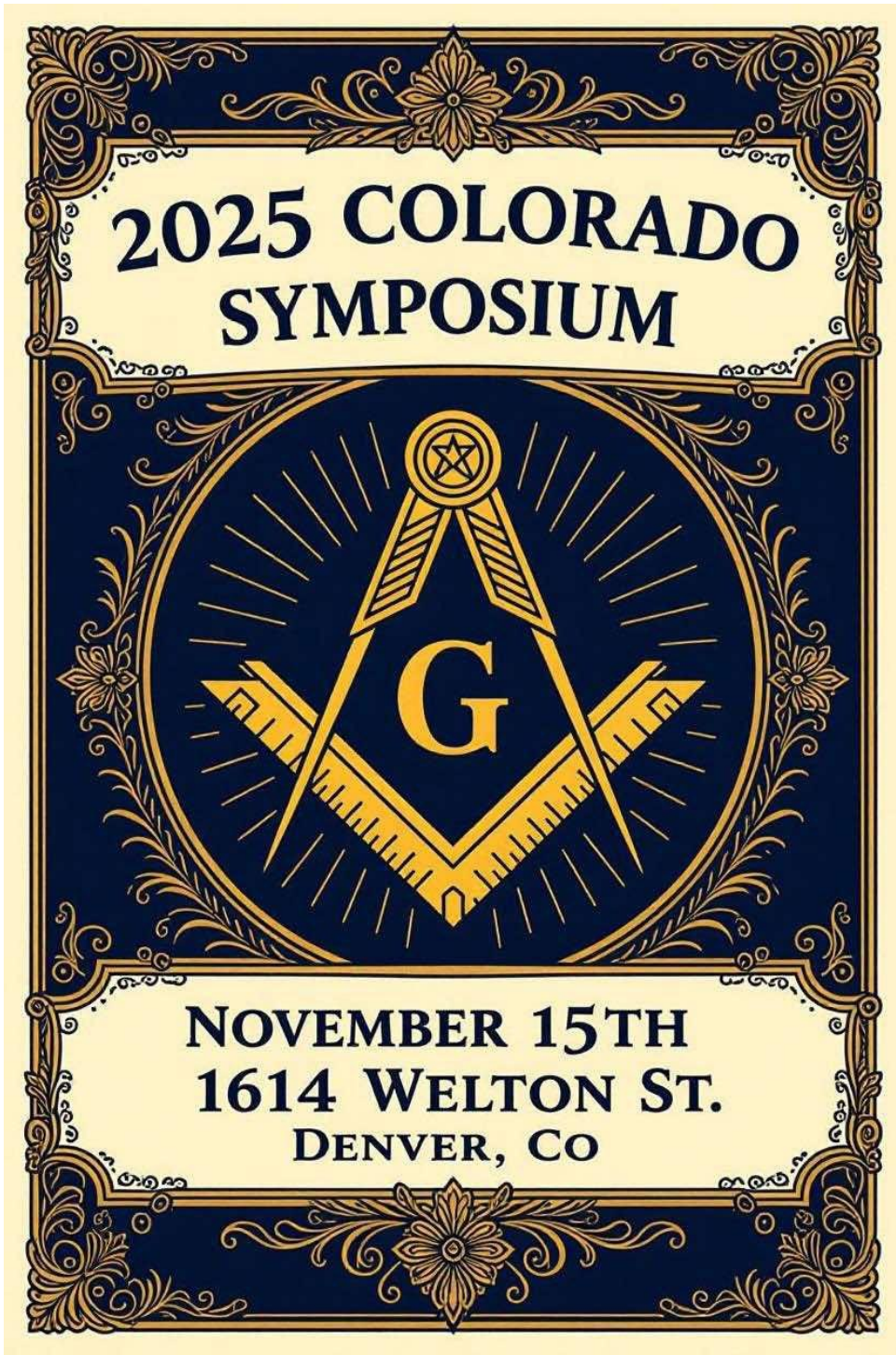

Within the Vault

“Wooden Square & Compass”

This emblem is said to have been carved out of a solid slab of wood with a jack knife by deceased Bro. Henry M. Morse, who came to Colorado in the pioneer days, bringing this token with him from Massachusetts where he was Raised in 1869 and affiliated with A.F. & A.M. in 1895. In 1915 Bro. Morse presented this emblem to WB George B. Clark shortly before laying down his working tools in 1917 at the age of 85.

Membership Awareness and Retention

Greetings Worshipful Masters, Officers, and Brothers:

As 2024 begins and we look to Freemasonry through the lens of membership, awareness, and retention, I wonder how many of our lodges are actively engaged in membership, awareness, and retention in their lodges and in the local communities?

I would like to hear from the lodge representatives on what they are doing to promote the craft from membership to awareness in their lodges and community at large. What are the various ways that you maintain the members' awareness and interest of the craft? What local programs do you have in place to expand your membership locally?

One program for consideration for 2024 is the creation of a Craft Warden position or appointee and I bet that some of the lodges already have a similar position in place, but I would also like to know if that is the case for those that do and those that do not.

The concept of the Craft Warden would be to address the above membership and awareness activities inside the individual lodges and build an interface between the lodges and membership & awareness and the GL district lecturer. The Craft Warden would be responsible for local membership & awareness activities for your lodge and allowing for a larger base of ideas and exchange of information between the GL committee and the lodges. The position could encompass things like holding and scheduling local training and presentations for your lodge as educational, awareness, retention type material, candidate open houses or even scheduling digital meetings based on approved content and format as an open meeting.

A coordinator for any and all membership and awareness, and retention for the members and prospects for your lodge and local area but focusing on membership and awareness. By nature, the responsibilities of the Craft Warden and membership/awareness committee and GL District Lecturer will cross over into the education committee arena where the Craft Warden would find online content for various presentations, educational materials and more from the members login from the education portal.

Membership Awareness and Retention

It is time that we engage and invest in the lodges into their future and build on our wider experiences that a lot of us are doing today. I would like to get a feeling from the lodges if such a program would be embraced and if they would consider creating such a position.

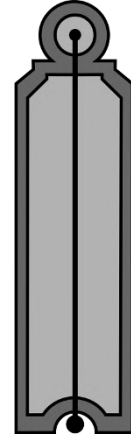
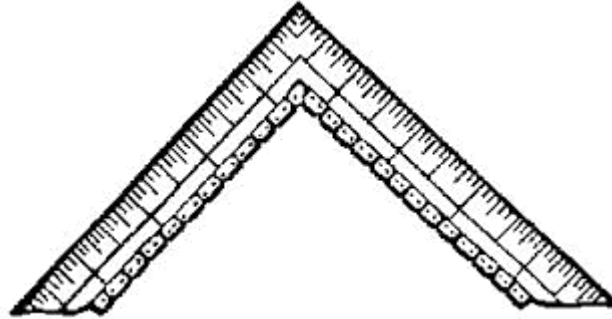
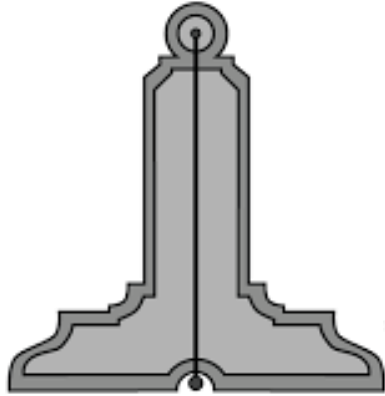
